AFFORDABLE CARE ACT (ACA) Supported 2020 ballot measure to expand Medicaid, an option available as part of ACA, known as Obamacare?	Yes. Backed Medicaid expansion <u>"to give over</u> 200,000 Missourians the health care they deserve, return 100,000 eligible kids their insurance and keep our rural hospitals open."	No. Called Medicaid expansion a <u>"massive tax</u> increase that Missourians cannot afford." <u>"I</u> don't think it's the time to be expanding anything in the state of Missouri right now."
<b>CAMPAIGN FINANCE</b> Require more disclosure about the sources of campaign financing?	Yes. <u>"As auditor, I've witnessed firsthand how</u> our government works for insiders and <u>special interests.</u> That's why I'm making campaign finance reform a priority."	No. <u>Opposed 2018's Constitutional</u> <u>Amendment One</u> , which subjects lawmakers to open-records laws, limits lobbyist gifts, and limits partisan legislative redistricting.
<b>COVID-19</b> Tighter or looser restrictions to control pandemic?	Tighter. Wants new strategy including <u>a mask</u> <u>requirement</u> , <u>"universal testing," more PPE</u> <u>and better guidance for schools.</u> <u>"We need a</u> <u>plan that keeps all Missouri families safe."</u> Infected children, <u>risk infecting</u> teachers, bus drivers, janitors, food service workers, parents, grandparents and neighbors.	Looser. Against mask requirements. <u>"I don't</u> <u>think that it is government's role to mandate</u> <u>who wears one.</u> " For early school reopening. Some kids will catch COVID at school but <u>"will</u> <u>get over it.</u> " <u>They won't have to go to</u> <u>hospitals or doctor's offices</u> .
<b>COVID-19 ECONOMIC RESPONSE</b> Focus of economic response to coronavirus pandemic?	Galloway's <u>Covid-19 recovery plan</u> includes paid sick leave, unemployment benefits, increased funding for county governments and support for small businesses.	June <u>recovery plan</u> calls for "no statewide public health order — Missouri will be fully open for business." Offers guidance including social distancing in workplace.
EDUCATION Increase K-12 public funding? Stand on higher ed funding?	Yes. Eliminate big business giveaways. Put more money in classrooms, pay teachers what they deserve, expand pre-kindergarten. Students deserve to pursue higher education without accruing mountains of debt.	No. Made cuts in state K-12 budget <u>and</u> <u>higher ed</u> to meet COVID-related shortfalls. <u>"We've had to face the reality of the</u> <u>situation and make some extremely difficult</u> <u>decisions."</u>
<b>EDUCATION</b> Use public funding for private and/or for-profit schools?	No. <u>Wants tighter oversight of charter</u> <u>schools.</u> <u>"Using tax \$ to fund charter schools"</u> <u>weakens public schools</u> . Will "strengthen the state's commitment to public schools."	Yes. <u>Declared week of Jan. 26 "Missouri</u> <u>School Choice Week"</u> as a "nonpartisan" effort to shine a "positive spotlight on effective education options for students."
<b>ENVIRONMENT</b> Tighten or loosen environmental regulations?	No position found.	Loosen. Signed law barring localities from issuing environmental rules on large farms to <u>"keep agriculture production in our state."</u>
GUN RULES Enact more restrictive legislation on guns?	Some. For <u>"common sense gun safety</u> <u>reforms"</u> including <u>universal background</u> <u>checks and closing loopholes on private sale</u> <u>of firearms</u> .	Mixed. <u>Co-sponsored</u> stand-your-ground law <u>expanding allowable deadly force to protect</u> <u>property</u> . <u>Supported conceal carry for school</u> <u>employees</u> . <u>But supported restrictions on</u> <u>ownership by minors and violent offenders</u> .

<b>IMMIGRATION</b> Support DACA program for residents brought to U.S. as children?	Yes. Thanks to Supreme Court, <u>"more than</u> 5,500 DREAMers [in state can] live, learn, and work without fear of deportation."	No position found. <u>Voted to prohibit</u> state benefits or ability to receive driver's licenses for illegal aliens.
<b>LABOR</b> Back "right-to-work" laws, eliminating the ability of unions to mandate dues for workers they represent?	No. By rejecting "right-to-work" legislation at the ballot box, Missouri has proved labor "is a force to be reckoned with." "I'll always have the back of" working people.	Yes. As governor, backed "right-to-work" ballot measure. When it failed, had his staff explore <u>feasibility of similar county-level</u> <u>laws</u> .
LEGAL ABORTION Keep legal or ban?	Legal. <u>Missouri families need to know they</u> <u>have access to the constitutional rights</u> <u>granted under <i>Roe v. Wade.</i> "I trust women</u> <u>to make their own health care decisions."</u>	Ban. Wants to make Missouri the <u>"most pro-</u> life state in the country." Signed bill to <u>ban</u> abortion at eight weeks with only exception to prevent death of the mother, but not for rape or incest.
LGBTQ RIGHTS Support same-sex marriage and protection from discrimination in employment, education, adoption, credit, housing, and public services.	Yes. <u>"All marriages deserve to be</u> <u>respected."</u> Called Supreme Court decision to protect LGBTQ Americans <u>"an enormous win</u> <u>for equality and fairness."</u>	Mixed. Has said <u>"I'm old school. I know</u> what's going to happen to these people." Clarified since that <u>"I don't believe in</u> discrimination." <u>"Anyone [who] chooses to</u> live that, that's their choice."
MARIJUANA Should state legalize marijuana?	Yes. <u>Supports legalization that includes</u> expunging criminal records.	No. <u>Does not favor recreational legalization</u> . <u>OK with medical use</u> . Criticism about clients of a close ally <u>being favored in securing</u> <u>medical licenses</u> .
MINIMUM WAGE Support raising state minimum wage to \$12 an hour by 2023?	Yes. Supported Proposition B, which will raise state minimum wage to \$12 an hour by 2023. <u>"Every worker deserves a living wage."</u>	No. Did not support Proposition B and says he <u>does not support raising minimum wage</u> <u>"at this time."</u>
<b>PLANNED PARENTHOOD</b> Support Planned Parenthood's receiving public funds for non- abortion-related care?	Yes. <u>"I trust women to make their own health</u> care decisions I'm not scared to say that." Endorsed by Planned Parenthood.	No. <u>Signed budget that eliminated PP</u> <u>Medicaid reimbursement for non-abortion</u> <u>services</u> like <u>cancer screening</u> , STD testing, <u>and birth control</u> .
<b>POLICE/COMMUNITY ISSUES</b> Restrict police use of force and increase public oversight?	Yes. <u>Supports ban on choke holds and no-knock warrants</u> . <u>"The disparities in our criminal justice system are real." Must make Missouri accountable to all citizens</u> .	No. " <u>Now is the time to 'stand up and</u> <u>support' law enforcement."</u> Officers need to have the "tools" to fight violent criminals.
<b>TAXES</b> Support cuts in state taxes?	No. As auditor, said, <u>"Years of tax cuts and</u> giveaways" have put state in situation where <u>"downturn will lead to big cuts in education,</u> transportation and other services."	Yes. <u>Cut income taxes in 2018</u> on top of significant 2014 tax cuts.
<b>VOTING RULES</b> Support stricter ID requirements and other rules on voting?	No. <u>"Missouri's notary requirement [to vote</u> by mail] is voter suppression — especially during a pandemic. It makes voting absentee more difficult by design."	Yes. As state senator voted for constitutional amendment to require photo ID and prove citizenship. Signed bill allowing voting by mail only if ballots are notarized, except if the voter is susceptible to COVID.

Other candidates include <u>Rik Combs</u> (Libertarian) and <u>Jerome Bauer</u> (Green). Due to limited space, we can only include candidates polling 15%, but check out their websites.
