ABORTION Ban or legal?	Ban. In March 2022 said, if elected governor, "I would try to ban abortionThere is no reason for us to be having abortions." In July 2022 said, would allow exceptions for rape and incest, as well as endangering mother's health.	Legal. "There will never be an abortion ban in Minnesota under my watch." Signed an order to "help protect people seeking or providing abortions in Minnesota from legal repercussions in other states."
CLIMATE CHANGE Should climate change be a top priority? Tax or limit the output of greenhouse gases, or support renewable energy?	No. "We can't let our wants undercut and neuter our economy." "With climate, we need to be carefulWe've used this term 'follow the science' ad nauseam over the last couple of yearsI think there's climate change; it's gradual, it's slow." Would "do infrastructure" that "can stand up to the heavy rains and the floods."	Yes. Proposed for Minnesota to produce 100 percent carbon-free electricity by 2040. "Our Administration will work with private, non-profit, and government partners and Minnesotans to address climate change while creating jobs across the state."
EDUCATION How to address the teaching of issues around race and gender identity?	Proposes <u>"Parents' Bill of Rights"</u> allowing parents to review curriculum and materials. <u>"When we do things like critical race theory or hyper-sexualize our kids" with instruction that isn't age appropriate "we're doing them no favors."</u>	Would establish an Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Center within the state's Department of Education to "address instances of systemic racism." Would tailor academic standards to be reflective of diverse students. As teacher, helped start a high school's first gay-straight alliance.
EDUCATION Increase funding for K-12 and higher education?	No. When asked about putting more or less money into public schools, said <u>"Less money, I think it's a black hole."</u>	Yes. His 2022 budget adds 2% to the general education formula, with investments in reading proficiency, free meals, & teacher recruitment & mentoring. "We're proposing historic investments in schools."
EDUCATION Use public funding for private and/or for-profit schools?	Yes. Would convert low-performing public schools to charter or private schools and would allow students to use public funds to pay for private school tuition or homeschooling.	No. Opposes publicly funded voucher plans and argues they would "decimate" public schools. Says he's "not going to defund our public schools."
ELECTIONS Did Joe Biden legitimately win the 2020 Presidential election?	No. As to whether Biden won the electoral college vote, said <u>"I don't know."</u> Said that in Arizona <u>dead people voted in 2020 election.</u>	Yes. Congratulated Biden. "His victory puts us on the path towards restoring civility and decency in this country."
ENVIRONMENT Loosen or tighten environmental regulations?	Loosen. Would roll back the Minnesota clean car rule requiring the auto industry to sell more hybrid and electric cars and would end the state moratorium on nuclear power.	Unclear. Environmental policy focuses primarily on infrastructure and remediation projects, along with community programs and grants, voluntary programs, and enforcing existing regulations.
GUN RULES Pass less or more restrictive legislation on guns?	Less. Opposes <u>universal background checks and</u> red flag laws. Supports a Stand Your Ground law for Minnesota.	More. Supports red flag laws and background checks. "These proposals won't stop everyone, but what if we'd been able to stop Uvalde? Just one is enough."

HEALTH CARE Increase government role in health care, such as expanding Medicaid, limiting drug prices, or promoting COVID safety?	No. Has supported competition in "the healthcare field by allowing for-profit insurance companies to operate in Minnesota." "Single payer healthcare will not solve the health care problems in Minnesota and will damage patient-doctor relationships." Compared COVID public health measures to the rise of Nazism.	Yes. His supplemental budget earmarks \$2.5 billion for health and safety initiatives including \$145.7 million to create a MinnesotaCare buy-in program to expand healthcare access. Expanded hospital funding to deal with the Omicron COVID wave.
IMMIGRATION How to handle immigration? Support a path to citizenship for "DACA" participants brought to the US as children?	Said "taking in immigrants without proper resources would be "undercutting so much of Minnesota's fabric of life." Says states aren't mandated to accept federal orders to resettle immigrants. No position found on DACA.	Supports a path to citizenship for DACA <u>Dreamers and Temporary Protected Status</u> <u>holders</u> . Signed into law <u>a bill protecting</u> <u>immigrant youth, ensuring they receive</u> <u>necessary resources</u> .
LABOR Make it easier or harder for unions to organize?	Unclear. Says <u>"teacher's union bosses"</u> are trying <u>"to deter parents from taking standardized tests"</u> and <u>"encouraged draconian COVID lockdown policies."</u>	Easier. "Minnesota is pro-labor and will ALWAYS be pro-labor on my watch. We can't afford to have leaders who undermine unions and workers." "As long as I'm governor, I will NEVER sign anti-union legislation."
LGBTQ RIGHTS Limit or expand LGBTQ rights?	Likely limit. Voted <u>against banning conversion</u> <u>therapy</u> but was "nauseated" by his vote. "Why are we telling elementary kids that they get to <u>choose their gender?"</u> Repeated the <u>internet</u> <u>rumor</u> that <u>some schools have litter boxes for</u> <u>kids who identify as "furries."</u>	Expand. Signed an order restricting the practice of conversion therapy. "To our LGBTQ+ community here in Minnesota: We will always stand with and value you."
MARIJUANA Should recreational marijuana be banned or legal?	Legal. Coauthored a bill to legalize recreational marijuana use.	Legal. Called on lawmakers to legalize recreational marijuana use in Minnesota. Proposed a budget with \$25 million set aside to create the new "Cannabis Management Office."
MINIMUM WAGE Keep or raise the state minimum from \$10.33/hour?	No position found.	Raise. As of 2018 supported <u>a \$15 minimum</u> wage. Signed an order <u>raising the minimum for personal care assistant workers to \$15.25</u> .
POLICE AND COMMUNITY How to address police use of force?	We "have to put more cops on the street." Would increase sentences for carjacking, stop nonprofits from funding bail, bring in the state patrol to augment local law enforcement, and "stiffen penalties for repeat violent criminals."	Has supported new violence prevention programs, funding to ensure law enforcement wear body cameras, limits on no-knock warrants, and bans on chokeholds. Proposed \$300 million for local law enforcement.
STUDENT FINANCIAL AID Support lowering interest on student loans or forgiving them?	No. "Because Joe Biden decided yesterday to give away billions of dollars or whatever it amounts to doesn't mean today I should speak to the issues." Called plan "playing Santa Claus."	Yes. Supports eliminating state income tax liability on federal student loan forgiveness.
TAXES Should corporations and wealthier individuals pay less or more taxes?	Less. As part of an effort toward <u>"shrinking the government,"</u> would <u>eliminate the state income tax</u> . Since that tax is progressive, <u>the change would benefit the wealthiest Minnesotans</u> .	More. Wants "large and profitable corporations and the wealthiest Minnesotans to pay their fair share so our students, working families and small businesses have a fair shot."
VOTING RULES Support tightened restrictions on such voting rules as absentee and early voting, and voter ID?	Yes. "We need voter ID in Minnesota." Would "tighten-up" mail-in ballots.	No. "Blatant voter suppression efforts continue across the country. Here in Minnesota, we will not stand for it. Our state will continue to lead in the fight to safeguard voting rights."
