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What Does the Sixth Amendment Protect?



The 6th Amendment, often called the Right to a Fair Trial, protects people who are accused of a crime. It became law in 1791 as part of the Bill of Rights. It guarantees several important rights during a criminal trial. This amendment says that anyone charged with a crime has the right to a speedy, public trial with a fair jury made up of regular people, not the government. It also requires that the accused must be told exactly what they are being charged with, be allowed to see and question the witnesses against them, and bring in witnesses of their own. Finally, it ensures that everyone has the right to a lawyer. If someone cannot afford one, the court must provide one.

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
