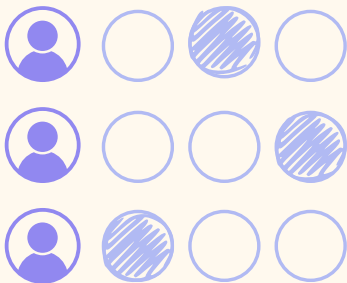


WHAT IS RANKED CHOICE VOTING

What is Ranked Choice Voting?



Ranked Choice Voting is a system where voters don't pick just one candidate; they rank candidates from their favorite to their least favorite. If a candidate receives more than 50% of the first-choice vote, then they win the election. If no candidate wins more than 50% of the first-choice vote, the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated. The voters who chose that candidate with the fewest votes now have their vote transferred to their next-highest-ranked candidate. This process continues until one candidate wins over 50% of the vote.

Ranked Choice Voting is used in some U.S. cities and states.

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Supporters of this system believe that Ranked Choice Voting is a fairer system because winners need majority support, or the popular vote, to win.

Critics argue that it can be a confusing system and requires voters to learn more about multiple candidates before casting a ballot.
