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Why your November 3 vote matters

The [election](#) on November 3 will decide the District 1 seat on the Louisiana Public Service Commission. Republican Stephanie Hilferty, independent Chris Justin, and Democrat Connie Norris are running for a six-year term. The Commission [currently has](#) a partisan makeup of 3 Republicans and 2 Democrats. There is also an election this year for District 5.

The Louisiana Public Service Commission regulates state utilities

The Commission [consists](#) of five members who serve staggered six-year terms, each representing one district in the state. The Public Service Commission [is tasked](#) with regulating all public utilities and common carriers, except for utilities owned and operated by cities and towns. This means that the Commission [regulates and sets](#) rates for electricity, water, natural gas, and other services including telecommunication. State law has also granted the Commission additional regulatory powers, including [executing](#) the “Telephonic Solicitation Relief Act,” known as the Do Not Call program. The Louisiana Public Service Commission [is established](#) by Article IV, Section 21 of the Louisiana Constitution.

The Commission [conducts](#) administrative hearings and [monthly meetings](#) to gather the needed information to make their final determinations. In recent years, the Commission has [ended](#) net metering, reducing the incentive for households to install solar panels. It also [approved](#) a new rate plan for Magnolia Water, along with an audit into the company’s business practices, [approved](#) a large grid resiliency plan to be executed by Cleco Power, and [fast tracked](#) the construction of seven new natural gas power plants to power a new Meta data center.

- **On accountability,** [supports](#) updating the outdated reliability standards that are used to grade utility companies. Doing so would make the utilities accountable for their current service. [Supports](#) requiring faster response times to power outages. [Seeks](#) “full financial transparency.”
- **On data centers,** [supports](#) Governor Landry’s executive order requiring data center companies to pay for utility costs. “If the data center needs that additional power, they are the ones paying for that power.”

- **On accountability,** [started](#) a website for people to report damaged electrical equipment, especially leaning utility poles, around Louisiana.
- **On data centers,** [says](#) that data centers should pay 100 percent of their costs, including power, transmission lines, and water.

- **On accountability,** “Louisiana families [deserve](#) to know when, where, and how utility companies are spending their money. It’s time for sunshine, full accountability and transparency.” Elected commissioners “[need](#) to disclose their private meetings.”

STEPHANIE HILFERTY

- **On infrastructure,** [supports](#) investing in storm-resilient infrastructure and smart grid technology.
- **On utility rates,** [voted](#) as a state representative to require utilities to [reimburse](#) ratepayers for utility overcharges.
- **On water oversight,** [introduced](#) legislation to give the New Orleans City Council more control over the city's Sewerage and Water Board, including more authority to set rates and fees. [Says](#) that Magnolia Water needs to be audited and should not be authorized to make any new acquisitions "for the time being."

Stephanie Hilferty is [currently](#) a member of the Louisiana House of Representatives, where she has served since 2016. She earned a bachelor's degree from Loyola University New Orleans. In addition to serving as a legislator, [she is](#) a senior advisor for SRSA Commercial Real Estate.

CHRIS JUSTIN

- **On infrastructure,** [says](#) that the utility companies should be forced to improve electric, gas, and water systems before the Commission approves any rate increases. [Says](#) that private non-utility energy companies should be given a chance to improve the power grid. "If private industry will fund cheaper power, we take it."
- **On utility rates,** [worked](#) to reduce the amount that Louisiana ratepayers pay for "ghost charges" that do not go toward improved services. [Says](#) that the utility company guaranteed profit rate should be lowered from the current rate of 9.7%.
- **On water oversight,** [testified](#) in front of the Commission and said that Magnolia Water should not have its new rate approved without a complete company audit as part of a "full open-book rate case."

Chris Justin is [currently](#) an energy policy consultant with Emergent Grid Solutions, a role in which he has testified in front of the Louisiana Public Service Commission on reducing electricity costs. He earned a bachelor's degree in chemical engineering from Penn State University. He previously worked as a process engineer at Shell Norco Refinery.

CONNIE NORRIS

- **On utility rates,** [said](#), "we're fast approaching electric bills being as high as our house loans and water bills becoming our new car notes." [Intervened](#) in a Magnolia rate case before the Commission to push for lower bills for ratepayers. In the case a judge ordered an audit of Magnolia's finances before the company can apply for another rate increase.
- **On water oversight,** [advocated](#) for stopping all Magnolia Water acquisitions in Louisiana.

Connie Norris [has spent](#) the last two years as a community advocate in front of the Louisiana Public Service Commission challenging rate increases. She is otherwise retired and lives in Slidell. She [formerly](#) worked as a healthcare professional.

Norris's endorsements include: the [Louisiana](#) Democratic Party, among others.

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
